


Mr. W. W. Wiltrout, Superintendent


Sharon Hatfield will never give up, will she? I see her still capering about, only this time on the screen in Hollywood.




Melody Belnap will continue her fame in the basketball field along with the other married women on the Anchor Point Huskies Team.






SOPHOMORE CLASS OFFICERS

For the first time in the history of Homer High School, the Mariner basketball team won a berth in the tournament which decided the Western Alaska crown.

Competition in the basketball schedule this season was as stiff as it has been in any year, which found the Mariners on the short end in the win column at tournament time with an over-all four wins and 13 loss record. The keenness of the competition was evidenced in the voting by all other schools which, despite this record, ranked Homer ninth in Western Alaska out of twenty-four teams. Homer proved themselves worthy of higher recognition by challenging the eighth ranked Seward Seahawks to a two out of three game series for a tournament berth, and going on to win in the first two games by scores of 56-51 and 58-53.

One week later the Mariners, piloted by veteran Captain Glenn Carroll, found themselves looking up at the top-rated Fairbanks Malemutes in their first tournament tilt. Fairbanks proved too much for the short, scrappy Mariners. The score was 66-42.

The following day, the Fairbanks Malemutes were disqualified for playing an ineligible player in the regular season. This meant that the previous days' win had to be forfeited and the Mariners moved ahead in the winners' bracket. That night they met the fourth ranked Eielson Ravens. Again, height was the deciding factor. Although the score was 15-14 at the end of the first stanza, an effective press put an end to the Mariner threat. The score was 69-33.

The Homer Mariners displayed outstanding sportsmanship and floor conduct throughout the Tournament. For this, they were awarded the Sportsmanship Trophy. For three consecutive years, wherever and whenever the Mariners have entered a basketball tournament, they have displayed that type of character and sportsmanship which is characteristic of champions in all sports in any nation.






Homer skiers still managed a successful season in a year handicapped by a total lack of skiable snow in the local area.






Sally was honored by being chosen to represent Alaska in the Jr. Nationals held in Jackson, Wyoming. She made a fine showing in these races.

1:00 a.m. -- Jean gets out of car and goes into house.






