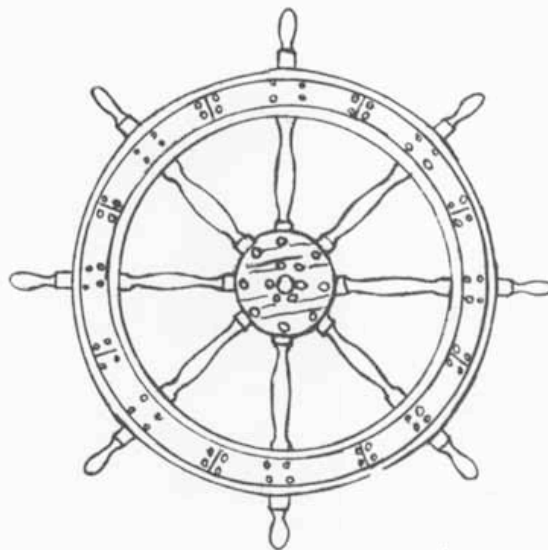

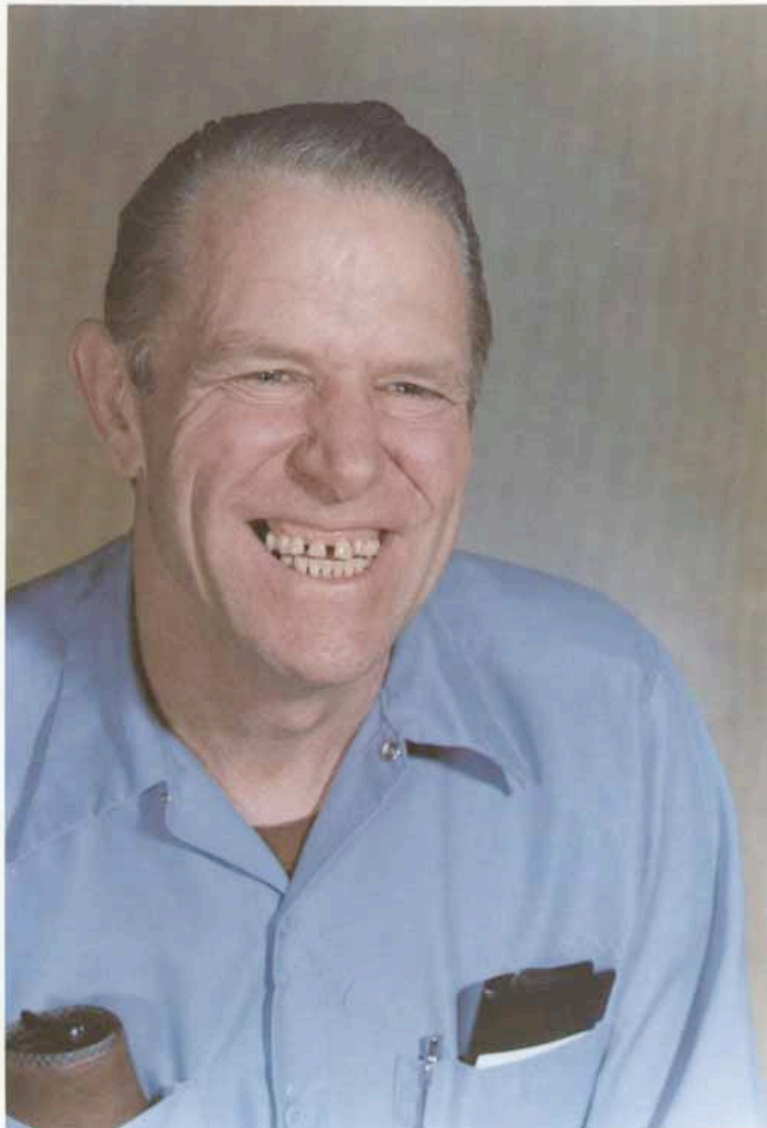

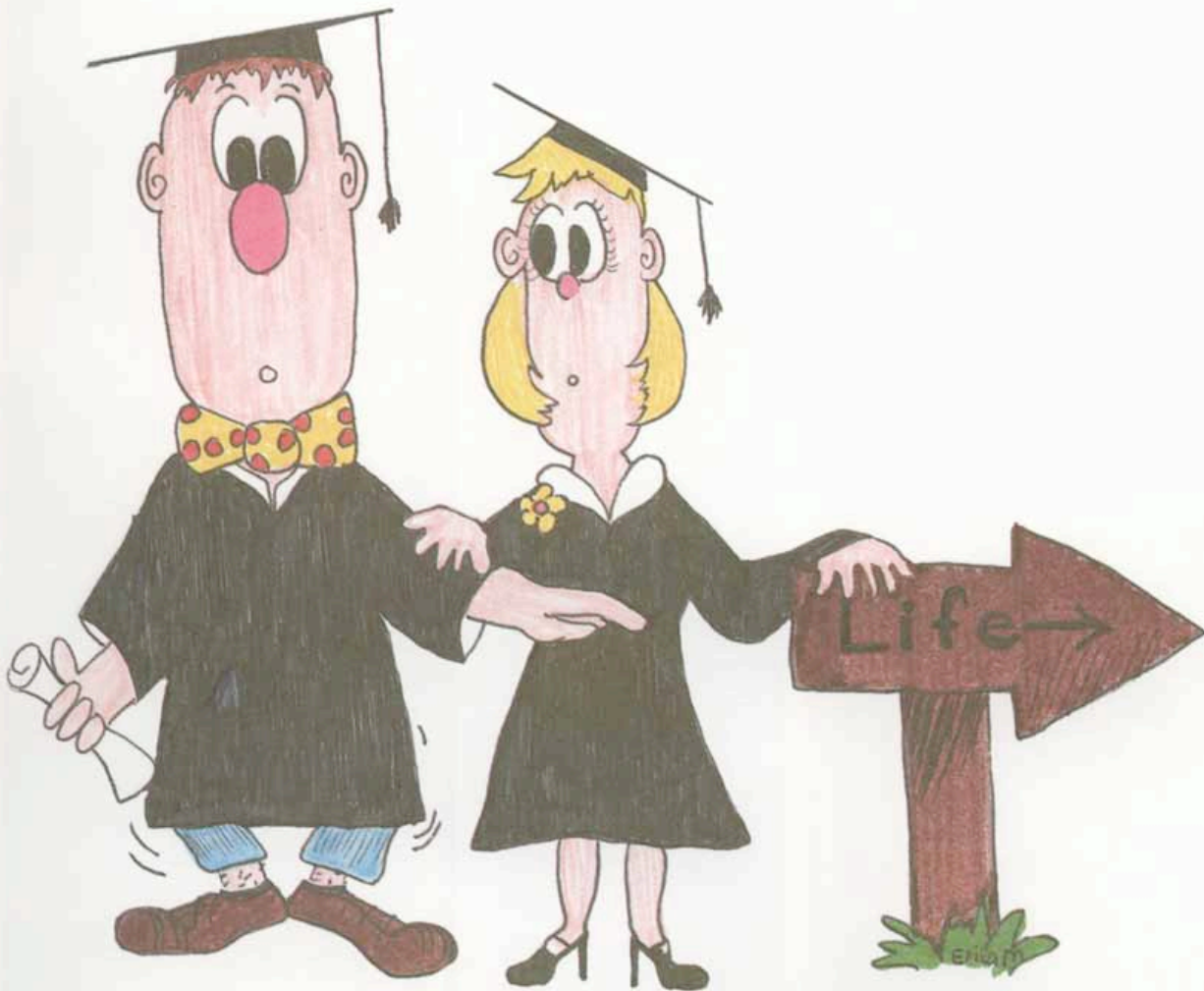


The Annual Staff is proud to dedicate the 1979 Mariner's Log to our Head Custodian, Mr. Leroy Elliot.

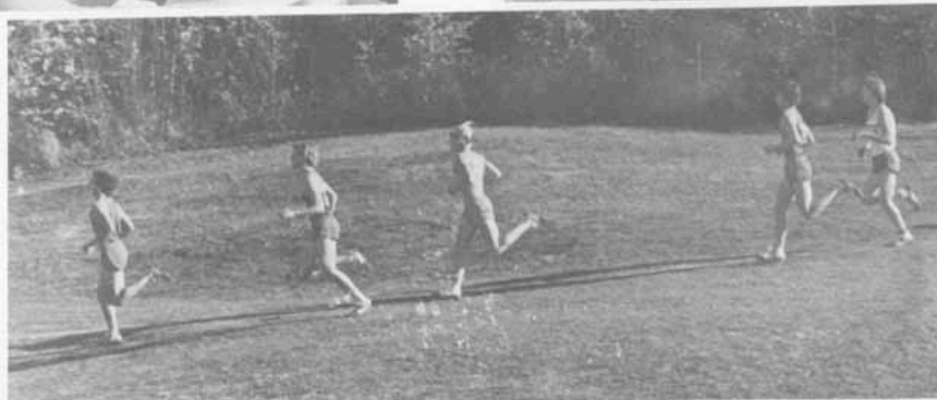

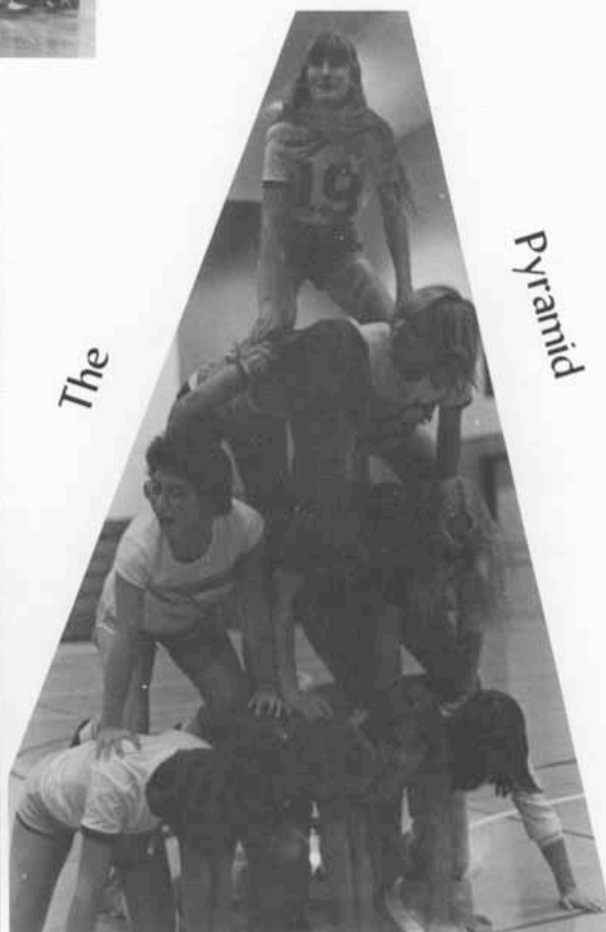


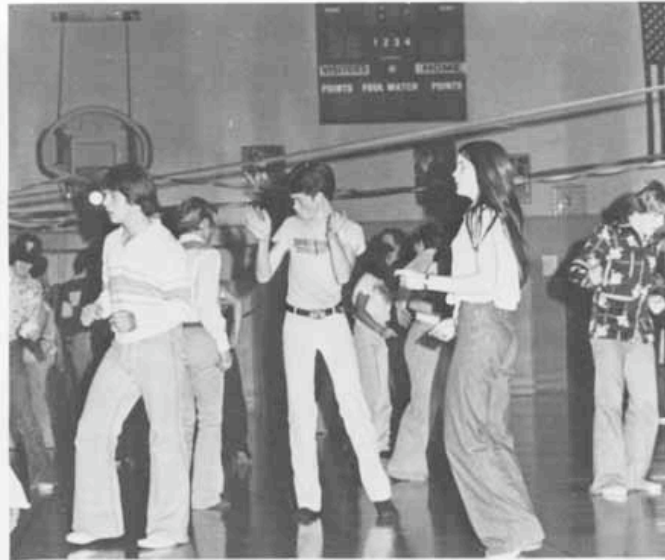
Battle Of The Sexes
